

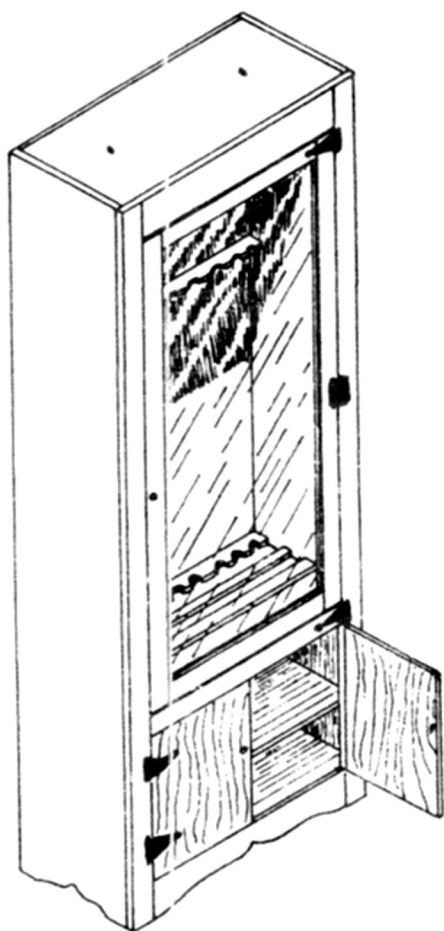


Gun Cabinet

Your guns and ammunition are always together and in neat order when stored in a gun cabinet. It should be locked to prevent theft and to keep children from playing with any type of firearms or ammunition. You can make the cabinet wider for additional guns if desired; however, it would be necessary to use two sets of glass doors because of the added weight. Be sure to use double strength or shatterproof glass on all glass doors. Provide two 3/8-inch holes in the top for ventilation.

The design and construction of the gun cabinet can vary. The corner construction of the glass door should be strong enough to withstand the weight of the glass. Finish the cabinet to blend with the other furniture in the room.
