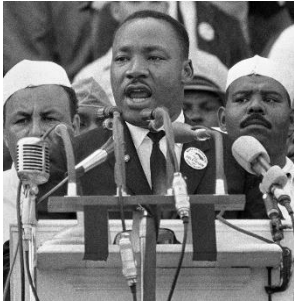

I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a where they will not be judged by the of their skin but by the content of their character.

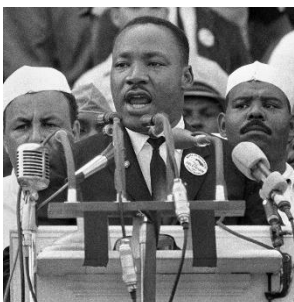
