Stephen Siller was a firefighter with Squad 1 in Brooklyn. On September 11, he finished his shift and wanted to play golf with his brothers. When he heard about the plane hitting the North Tower on his radio, he drove to the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel. The tunnel was closed for security. Stephen did not stop. He put on 60 pounds (27 kg) of gear and ran through the tunnel to the Twin Towers. He died while saving others. Today, thousands of people run the "Tunnel to Towers" race to honor him.
