

Do Vascular and Cardiovascular are same?

Vascular surgeons and cardiologists specialise in their respective fields but are different specialisations. Cardio refers to issues of the heart, whereas vascular relates to matters of the circulation system outside the core. A cardiovascular specialist is an expert in the cardiovascular system of the heart.

What Kind of Doctor is a Vein Specialist?

A phlebologist is a doctor who specialises in treating and diagnosing venous diseases, vein disorders, and other medically related to veins.



If we talk about the word Phlebologist is derived from the term Phlebology, which also signifies a type of medicine related to veins.

People generally prefer to call them a vein specialist or a vein doctor. Both are fine and are straightforward ways to refer to your doctor, but when talking about the medical term, the correct name is Phlebologist.

It is always recommended and advisable to ensure that the doctor with whom you are about to start the treatment has the expertise and that you feel comfortable with them during the consultation session, as vein health is crucial.

The specialist's key or elementary function is to examine, treat, prevent, and rehabilitate vein diseases and conditions. These doctors are trained primarily in vein disease or issues related to vein health.

Notable Symptoms through which disease can be identified are:

- Pain and aches
- Swelling in legs and feet
- Cramps
- Skin changes
- Varicose veins
- Leg ulcers
- Excess Itching,
- Feelings of Heaviness
- Discolouration of the Skin Around the Affected Part.



Apart from this, there are other symptoms as well, like veins might bulge out of the skin, and it can seem twisted or like a rope. Some vein treatments that a phlebologist may use to treat venous conditions include ambulatory phlebectomy, endovenous laser ablation, and sclerotherapy. In order to rescue or prevent this disease, doctors will suggest wearing stockings or socks to avoid upcoming complications.

Divergence or Dissimilarities between Phlebologist and Vein Specialist.

- Phlebology doctors achieve board certification via a written examination, not following an extensive residency training program.

- Phlebology doctors need to be explicitly trained to manage the operative (invasive) and medical care of patients with diseases of blood vessels. Their specialised vein training is obtained via short "Professional Development" and weekend courses.
- Phlebology doctors can not treat vascular disease as a speciality and are limited to the cosmetic treatment of Varicose veins.
- Phlebology doctors can NOT provide complete post-operative care, especially for any potential complications resulting directly from the procedure.

Vein Specialists have developed their Varicose Vein Treatment expertise in courses, which is not their primary speciality. Their hardcore training and practice made them unique and specialised as a doctor. They have advanced knowledge and have performed religiously in the practising or training period.

Vein Specialists are typically ABMS Board Certified Cardiologists, Interventional Radiologists, or Dermatologists.

- These specialists have conquered Board Certification following intensive residency training specific to their primary fields of study.
- These doctors can become Varicose Vein specialists following supplementary course work but need to be specifically trained in diagnosing and treating all aspects of Arterial and Venous disease.
